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much I wanted to move up here, ideally building my own house," said Sylvia.
"He said, 'Funny you should say that as I'm Alastair Macrae, a crofter and builder, and I've got land for sale'."
I went to view the plot at Tighnafiline, near Aultbea, and fell in love with it. I built a house there for myself about

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nouse there for myself about seven years ago.
"My home was lovely and I thoroughly enjoyed it, so when the builder said he had more land for sale, it seemed only natural to offer the same

natural to other the same standard of home to others. "Mr Macrae sold me a plot at Sand which had two derelict croft houses which I bought with a view to restoring, with his firm doing the building

work.
"On investigation, I learned there had originally been four houses there, so decided to build four new houses, using traditional methods, exactly where the originals once stood.
"It wasn't easy as I insisted the
builders took the stones down, number them, then reuse

"It's not the sort of thing a regular developer would do as it costs a lot, but it does make each home unique."
The result is four superb modern cottages which have been commended by Scottish Natural Heritage for their likeness to the look and laylikeness to the look and lay-out of the original crofts which once occupied this site. Perfectly combining modern technology with traditional style, each home sits in generous grounds and has been sensitively designed to take advantage of the special location with views towards Gruinard Bay. Each has an entrance porch,



has always been there. "There are authentic stone walls, double chimneys, pitched slate roofs and vaulted timber ceilings." Modern touches include Italian slate and oak floors; recessed lighting; antique-washed oak kitchen units, Belfast sink with

swan-neck tap and a host of

quality integrated kitchen appliances; Morso Squirrel

appinances; Morso squirrel wood-burner, and modern bath and shower suites. "The houses are spectacular, and I'm delighted with them," said Sylvia.

And while she didn't get down and dirty during the building, she ensured that things went according to plan.

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"I got into DIY after project-managing the transformation of a derelict Croydon bank into my company's headquarters.

"I got ripped off every which way. You could see me crying way. You could see me crying in the corner sometimes but, all in all, it was great fun and I learned a great deal, mainly how to hold an intelligent conversation with builders

"Just for fun, I set up a website where people could log on and see my DIY successes and disasters.
"It became such a success that,

at the end of 2007, I was able to give up my other business and run the website full-time."
